Gender Inequality Economic Independence



The 2017 Gender Attitudes Survey tested attitudes around gender roles at home, at school, at work and in the community. New Zealanders were most likely to say that women and gender diverse people are losing out. Let's take a look at what they said, in their own words:

"Women are still classed as being the person who should be at home looking after the children and the house and as such are not as important as the male and therefore are not paid the same as a male."


believe it's seen as more important for men to have a well-paying job

"If we work too hard we aren't family focussed enough, if we don't cook and have the man do it, we are not a good wife or partner. If we work and have children in childcare full time we appear as bad mums."

"Female sports teams are not recognised equally with their male counterparts so don't get paid the same or find it hard to get funding."
