


Quick tips from other hosts

"It was great to have school aged kids involved in a celebration about breastfeeding and for them to see how normal it is"

"The message about breastfeeding/infant feeding, the implications on health and mental wellbeing for mothers, parents, whānau and our community needs to be out there and communicated to all"

"It's important to support mothers in their breastfeeding journey and normalise feeding in public rather than hidden away" Further feedback..

"We had a record number of people at our Kaupapa Māori breastfeeding support group today after a presentation about it at one of our events"

"We were really pleased that it was more inclusive this year to include all whānau, as a women and baby don't exist in isolation... To illustrate what I mean by this, we had multiple generations (e.g. Grandparent, Mum, Dad and Baby or Aunty, Mum and baby or Mum, baby, Dad and Dad's friend) feel welcomed and included to join in Big Latch On events... We had one mum who was exclusively pumping and the Dad felt comfortable attending and giving EBM to baby on the day. This inclusivity creates a strong connection and sense of belonging"

"Particular to our event, and I'm sure elsewhere too, many women travelled from outer suburbs to attend"
